PATIENT CARE NOTES AND RESCUE

See reverse for recording patient care

Records of the patient to be made when found, and at regular intervals.

Make **two** copies – one to remain with the Patient Care Party and one to go out with the Warning Party.

Record the date and time the patient was found, and date and time of the injuries – if known. Record all times in 24 hour format.

Record the location of the patient now, including features that may assist in guiding a Rescue Party to the site. Include details of the features visible from the air and on foot.

Describe the main injury, and any significant secondary injuries.

Describe what is known of the events that led to the incident.

Record known medical condition that may have an impact on the present health of the patient.

Record medical details from a Medical Alert tag, if any.

Record known allergies.

Time

Section A – record 4 at 15 minute intervals, then 6 hourly

Section **B** – record at things happen

Level of consciousness – A = Alert, V = Verbal (able to talk), P = Pain, U = unconscious

Breaths – rate per minute, depth, noise, rhythm, effort, odours

Pulse – rate per minute, rhythm regular or irregular

Pain – score 1-10. 1 = a pinch, 5 = pain you can just cope with, 10 = worst every pain

Skin – colour, temperature, moisture

Body – function includes incontinence, vomiting, spasms. Positioning includes lying, foetal, fitting, rigid, out of position. Record anything useful.

General

- Do NOT rush to get help
- Appoint a leader of the Care Party and the Warning Party
- Take time to assess the situation, the options, and plan the activities of the Care Party and the Warning Party
- Prepare a map of the area improvised if necessary
- Assess the total time that could be involved, and plan for the worst case
- Assess the resources and gear available, and allocate it to the Care Party and the Warning Party.
